Every North Dakotan should be excited about the most recent coaching position vacancy being filled by one of our own. Paul Casey (Gus) Bradley was tapped as Jacksonville Jaguars' head football coach. Casey becomes only the second North Dakotan (I know, he was born and grew up in Zumbrota,

MN) to be a head coach in the NFL---Ron Erhardt, being the first. Gus Bradley spent four years at NDSU as a defensive back, NDSU graduate assistant coach, Fort Lewis College (CO) defensive coordinator, NDSU defensive back coach and defensive coordinator, Tampa Bay Buccaneers' defensive back coach, Seattle Seahawks defensive coordinator and newly named Jacksonville Jaguars' head coach. Thank you Casey (Gus)!

To my knowledge North Dakota claims two NBA Head Coaches as natives: Bill Fitch (really a head coach at UND, and not a full native from North Dakota) and Phil Jackson, native of Williston and head coach for the Chicago Bulls and Los Angeles Lakers. NDHSCA and NDSU will continue to offer the credit/credits as previously. Bucky Maughan will be our instructor of record. I expect that we will continue with the same duties and responsibilities for coaches/students for credits. One of the responsibilities of arrangements and developments for requesting credit is to maintain a 65%-75% advanced degree of presenters. Needless, that limits our State Championship and Coach of the Year recipients as speakers.

I just received an e-mail from Paula (Roger) Stone through Dave Michaelson. Roger has had complications with a slow growing meningioma (tumor) that is benign. The doctors do not think the tumor is causing other issued. More tests are being done as I write this with a CT and MRI angiogram. Roger and Paula will meet with his Mayo doctor on Wednesday regarding treatment of the meningioma. Keep Roger & Paula and their families in your prayers.

I want to repeat our Fall *Dakota Coach* statement regarding Coaches Education Requirement.

"As most coaches know, the Coaches Education Requirement is in effect! Beginning with 2013 every coach will be required to have accomplished specific preparation for entering the coaching profession. As a professional each coach will have completed the NFHS Fundamentals of Coaching Course (on-line, blended classroom, or while in college within the past two years), completed the NFHS Concussion Management Course and complete a First Aid Course. In addition, each coach will be required to be certified in CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) and in use of AED (automated external defibrillator)."

"The coaching permit must be renewed every five years (except for the CPR requirement). Coaches who have graduated from college with a coaching minor, which includes Fundamentals of Coaching, First Aid, CPR and Concussion Management, will be given a Coaching Permit, if the coach has graduated from college within four years of the application for the permit. Each school's activities director or high school principal is responsible for record-keeping and submission of the NDHSAA Coaches Permit Completion verification. A Permit Certificate will be sent to each coach from NDHSCA! All certified coaches with permits will be posted on the NDHSAA website."

I urge all football coaches to contact Johnny Tusa, American Football Coaches Association, for the recent issue that NCAA Division I Board of Directors had placed on the table regarding recruitment of sophomores. Grant Teaff and the high school coaches of AFCA have been instrumental in leading to rejection of the issue on the table for consideration. Football coaches need to be cognizant of what is happening on the NCAA level as well as on the national scene.

Although I had to scrap my meeting with NO-CAD because of my complication with making airline reservations, I was informed that the Florida Activities Association has a new problem: transgender, gays and lesbians who want to compete across gender lines.

All coaches should begin planning to attend the NHSACA National Annual Meeting. North Dakota has 16 NHSACA National Coach of the Year Finalists being honored with potential of being named National Coach of the Year (note article in this issue of *Dakota Coach*). We also have a registration form in this issue (see pages 32-33). Our NHSACA National Coach of the Year Finalists deserve our support and presence. Please send me an e-mail if you register for attendance.

I want to inform football coaches of a relatively new product called the *brain pad*; this dual arch technology can reduce impact energy to the TMJ & base of the brain. We will have the product on display at the convention in July. It may be another product that is mandatory for football and hockey. Beware and be prepared!

Dr. Jonathan Geiger will be available for NDHSCA to discuss pertinent medical issues as well as steroid/human growth hormone issues. With Armstrong's admission to doping and use of illegal substances, each coach has additional responsibility to be aware of issues.

2013 NDHSCA Concussion Legislation

Two Years ago, the North Dakota Legislature passed legislation that required specific recognition of and treatment for concussions in high school athletics.

The responses by coaches, athletic directors, officials, medical personnel, athletes and parents have been very satisfying. All involved entities have identified the legislation as one step in a successful beginning to protect the high school student-athlete.

The responsible groups (NDHSCA, NDHSAA, NDIAAA, NDCSSP and NDSBA) responsible for establishing Coaches' Education Requirements have established "Concussion Management" as a required course for the Requirements. Jeff Lystad, MD, from Sanford Orthopedics & Sports Medicine responded with the following statement:

The new concussion legislation, protecting school sanctioned athletics for grades 7-12, has been very successful. We are seeing much more awareness of concussion symptoms by coaches, officials, parents and the athletes themselves. The message of no return to the game or practice until evaluated and cleared by a licensed health care provider is getting across. I work very closely with injured athletes and their parents and have had very positive feedback from them regarding the recovery period and gradual return to play. No one wants to see prolonged symptoms following a concussion, and this monitored approach to management is helping minimize those symptoms.

After two years with the legislation requirements in practice, additional legislation is on the Legislative Calendar. We as coaches need to be aware of this new legislation and the effect it has on our coaching. Dr. Lystad responded with the following statement on the new legislation:

At this point, the legislation is for grades 7-12 athletes in school sanctioned sports. It is very important to extend this protection to include all youth athletes. In North Dakota alone the number of children that participate in football, hockey, soccer, basketball, volleyball, gymnastics and others for 6th grade and younger is staggering. We need to include these young athletes under this same umbrella.

We know that the developing brain in these young athletes is especially vulnerable to the effects of a concussion. By including all youth athletes [in the legislation] the state's athletic providers will help bring about a safer environment for this younger grade of kids to participate in the sports they love [without fear of those dangers that we found fit to nearly eliminate from the older athletes.

Every coach has the responsibility to know the legislation and the implications of those laws. Also, every coach needs to become aware of the effect of the new proposed legislation. The goal of every coach is to provide every athlete the safest environment possible.

Andy Braaten is a of araduate New Rockford School High and Mayville State University. He is presently in his 28th year of teaching and coaching at Carrington High School, the only place he has been employed



as an educator. He has always coached only girls' basketball; he spent 14 years as an assistant at Carrington High School before becoming head coach for the past 14 years.

Braaten's head coaching record in girls' basketball 227 wins with 80 losses. The Cardinals girls' basketball team won the North Dakota Class B State Championship in 2011. Andy was been named Region 4 and District 7 NDHSCA Girls' Basketball Coach of the Year.

Karla Michaelson, Carrington High School Athletic Director, wrote a glowing recommendation for Andy. She notes Andy's foundation for success in coaching and athletics is dedication. Ms. Michaelson adds that determination, combined with dedication, is the formula for making athletes and coaches the best they can be.

Coach Braaten and his wife Ruth have two children: Noelle and Nikki.

Jeremy St. Aubin is a graduate of Towner HS and the University of North Dakota. He also received his graduate degree from UND. He has coached at Ashley High School (five years) and South Border High School (five years).

St. Aubin's head coaching record for his varsity girls' golf is 53-28. His varsity boys' golf record is 65-23. Jeremy was selected NDHSCA Class B Regional Boys' Golf Coach



of the Year in 2006, 2007, and 2012. He was also selected as the Class B Regional Girls' Golf Coach of the Year in 2006, 2008 and 2010. In 2006, St. Aubin was awarded the NDHSCA Class B State Boys' Golf Coach of the Year.

Jeremy will serve as the Girls' Golf Class B State Manager in 2013. He serves as the Class B Girls' Golf Representative on the NDHSCA Advisory Committee to NDHSAA. Jeremy serves as Rehabilitation Director and physical therapist for several schools in South Central North Dakota. He was recognized with the "Unsung Hero Award" in 2009 as a Lions' Club member. He is a member of the local Job Development Authority and the Chamber of Commerce. Coach St. Aubin serves as Sing Leader for Zion Sunday School and is a Hunter Safety Instructor. He is served the community as Head Strength & Conditioning Coach for ten years.

Brad Webster, Ashley High School Superintendent, speaks in glowing terms as he endorses Jeremy for the NDHSCA Vice-President Ballot. Mr. Webster states that "He plays a very active role in our athletic programs and takes extra time to ensure to reinforce honesty and integrity any and every chance he gets." Mr. Webster continues in his recommendation with "(Jeremy) always tries to teach and train the kids that winning and losing is a small part of any game and give them 'the big picture' of what it is to be a part of the team."

James Haussler is a 1973 graduate of Monango (ND) High School; he received his BA degree from Jamestown College with a double major in History/ Political Science and Health, Physical Education and Recreation (HPER). He obtained his Master Degrees in Educational Administration and HPER from South Dakota State University and his Doctorate in Educational Administration from the University of North Dakota.



In 1978 Jim began his teaching career at Finley-Sharon High School where he taught social studies and physical education and was the head coach for boys' basketball and boys' track & field; he was also assistant coach in football. A year later he continued his teaching regimen at New England High School. In 1983 Jim moved to Aberdeen (SD) Central High School, to serve as the high school's assistant principal and athletic director. A year later he moved to Bismarck Public Schools to serve as an assistant principal at both Bismarck High School and Bismarck Century High School, along with directing the vocational program for one year, positions he held until 1992 when he was named Bismarck Public Schools Activities Director. He continues to hold that position to this date

In 1981, Jim was selected as NDHSCA Track & Field Regional Coach of the Year. In 1996 and 2006, he was named NDHSCA Class A Athletic Director of the Year. Haussler was also named NDHSCA West Region Class A Athletic Director of the Year on four occasions. He became a Certified Athletic Administrator in 1997. In 1997, he was selected as Class A Athletic Director of the Year by the Principals' Association.

Jim has managed approximately 200 NDHSAA regional and state events. In 2002 he was recognized by NDHSCA with the Special Recognition Award. Haussler was selected as a finalist for the National High School Athletic Coaches Association Athletic Director of the Year in 2004, 2007 and 2010. This past spring he was inducted into the North Dakota Track & Field Hall of Fame.

Presently, Haussler serves as Past President of the North Dakota Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association (NDIAAA). He has also served in a number of other officer roles. He is Past President of the Western Dakota Association (WDA). He has also served in other officer roles. Jim has been Chairman of the Bismarck Community Bowl Authority (BCBA) since its inception (1997).

Dan Imdieke is a graduate of Sauk Centre (MN) HS and Jamestown College. He has spent 37 teaching years coaching at Linton High School. He has been head football coach for 36 years and head wrestling for 37 years all at Linton High School. He also served as athletic director at Linton High School for 25 years.



Imdieke has led his Lions' football teams to 19 Regional Titles and ten Regional Runnerup Titles. His football teams have been in the NDHSAA Championship Game on 12 occasions with five State Championships (1980, 1990, 2000, 2002 and 2003). The Linton Lion wrestling team has also won eight Regional Runnerup Titles, Three Regional Championships and four NDHSAA State Runnerup Titles (1980, 2001, 2002 and 2004). The Linton Lions Football Teams have won over 300 games under Dan's leadership. In addition his Wrestling teams have won 340 dual and multi-team contests.

Coach Imdieke chaired the NDHSCA All-State Selection Committee for ten years (1985-1995). He also has served a district and regional tournament manager and football playoff game manager during his years as athletic director.

Imdieke served on the NDHSCA-Shrine Football Coaching staff 12 times. He was on the Mon-Dak All-Star Football Staff twice. He was selected NDHSCA State Football Coach of the Year four times while being selected NDHSCA State Wrestling Coach of the Year twice. Dan's Regional Football coaches selected him Regional Coach of the Year ten times and Regional Wrestling Coach selected him as Regional Coach of the Year four times. He was selected NDHSCA District Athletic Director of the Year four times and Regional Athletic Director of the Year three times. Dan was named National High School Athletic Coaches Association Finalist twice (2005 and 2009).

Dan and his Wife, Cathy, have three children: Vanessa, Benjamin and Daniel. Coach Imdieke was nominated for NDHSCA Hall of Fame by Pete Moe, NDHSCA Past President.

Scott **Knowlen** is graduate of Bismarck High School and received his Undergraduate from the University of North Dakota. After spending five seasons (1984-1989) at Mandan High School as an assistant wrestling coach, he moved to Bismarck High School where has been head coach and co-head coach until the present time (23 years).



Scott has been recognized by his professional peers with the following awards:

Coach Knowlen has served his profession as USA Wrestling of North Dakota Cadet/Junior Director for the past 25 years. He has been selected to the NDHSCA Advisory Committee to NDHSAA for the past 13 years. Scott was on the Athletic Standing Committee for Bismarck Public School (1992-1998). He was state editor of the USA Wrestling Magazine (1998-2004). Coach Knowlen has been Fellowship of Christian Athletes Huddle Leader at Bismarck High School since 2009. He served as Emerging Leaders Member for the Century Baptist Church (2009-2010).


While Knowlen has been head coach and Co-Head coach, the Demons have won 16 WDA conference titles and 14 West Region Titles. They have also been West Region Runnerup Titlists four times. Coach Knowlen has guided the Demons to 13 NDHSAA State Championships and seven NDHSAA State Runnerup Titles. Scott has led the Demons to 324 dual and triangular wins over the past 23 years and 150 multi-teams meet victories Continued on page 10

Coach Knowlen and his wife, Shelly, have four children in a blended family: Zac Knowlen, Kael Knowlen, Amber Schneider and Jordan Schneider. **Coach Knowlen** was nominated for NDHSCA Hall of Fame by Dave Dougherty, NDHSCA Past President.

Jeske Jim is a graduate from Valley City High School and Valley University. City State Coach Jeske is now retired after 32 years of teaching science coaching a Killdeer High School. During his years at Killdeer, Jeske was head boys' & girls' track & field coach for 25 years and head boys' and girls' cross-country coach for



13 years. He also was an assistant football coach, junior high football coach and junior high basketball coach.

Coach Jeske was also active serving as Lettermen's Club Advisor for eight years, junior class advisor for four years and was the advisor for the local Dollars for Scholars for one year. Jim initiated and helped to organize the first Killdeer High School post prom party and the Killdeer High School fun

night which he continued to do for 20 years. He also started a science club where he was the advisor for five years.

During the years Coach Jeske was a head track & field coach, he led his teams to 166 multi-team invitational meet championships. The Killdeer Cowboys also won ten Regional Track & Field Titles, 11 Regional Runnerup titles and finished in the top five at the North Dakota State Track & Field Meet fourteen times. The Cowboys won two State Track & Field Runnerup Titles and two State Track & Field Championships (1985 & 1998).

While Jim coached cross-country for 13 years, his teams finished in the top five at the North Dakota State Meet nine times. The Cowboys finished State Runnerup twice. He was selected NDHSCA West Region Cross-Country Coach of the Year seven times and NDHSCA State Girls' Cross-Country Coach of the Year in 2008.

Jim was selected by his peers to be the NDHSCA Regional Track & Field Coach of the Year 11 times and Boys' Track & Field NDHSCA State Coach of the Year twice (1985 and 1998). He was a member of the NDHSCA Track & Field Advisory Committee to NDHSAA and Boys' Track & Field All-Star Coach in 1985. Jim was inducted into the North Dakota Track & Field Hall of Fame in 2009.

Jim and his wife, Chris, have three children: Jimmy, Tara and Lindsey.

Jeske was nominated for NDHSCA Hall of Fame by Bob Wheeling.

Two Years ago, Dave Dougherty became the President of the National High School Athletic Coaches Association by virtue of his progression through the Executive Committee chairs. At the same time, Don Prokes stepped forward to assume the Executive Director since Jerome Garry had resigned in June.

Don Prokes was very up-front with his being Executive Director and stated that he was willing to assume the role only as an interim position. He stated that his actions were purely gratuitous to have a person with experience to step forward to fill the gap until someone could be hired for "the long haul."

Dave's response:

As it is with most of us in the coaching profession. I actively pursued a career in education which would allow me to teach and coach. I had the desire to serve in this profession from before my high school days. And, like most of us, while I didn't seek service in the coaching profession, I was offered many opportunities to serve. As I began to serve my fellow coaches and the coaching profession, I developed a true passion for serving my cohorts. I believe that our coaches deserve more support, education, recognition and respect, than they receive; I have acquired positions that allow me to become an advocate for our coaches' needs and to facilitate changes necessary for our profession.

A new opportunity came to me recently when members of NHSACA's Executive Committee approached about assuming the Executive Director position for NHSACA. I have spent a lot of time weighing the commitment it would take in my life, and the life of my family. After many discussions with my wife, I have decided to accept this appointment following the summer convention in Des Moines, IA, should the NHSACA Board of Directors choose to hire me for their executive. While NHSACA is the oldest national coaches association, established by coaches and for coaches in the United States, it has been facing some serious challenges for the last years. Some of these challenges include: the need to expand our member -states; the need to identify new Corporate Sponsors (we lost our previous Corporate Sponsors during the economic downturn); provide economic accountability to NHSACA's Board of Directors; develop a stronger relationship with NO-CAD; and to re-establish the economic health of NHSACA.

These are the most vital issues facing NHSACA at this time and as Executive Director I will work with the NHSACA Executive Committee and Board of Directors to solve these issues. My number one goal is to provide for the health and growth of NHSACA today and into the future.

With that in mind, the NDHSCA Executive Committee has issued a hearty supportive handshake and arm to Dave as he assumes his quest to lead our nation's coaches and NHSACA. Good luck, Dave!

Randy Johnson - NHSACA Third Vice-President



Randy Johnson, NDHSCA Assistant Executive Secretary, was elected to the National High School Athletic Coaches Association Third Vice-President's position at the NHSACA National Annual Meeting in July. This marks the fourth North Dakota Coach to be elected to go through the chairs to become the NHSACA President.

Randy is an unbelievable person and coach who works tirelessly for his school, his community, and NDHSCA; he will soon bring that same North Dakota work ethic to the National Association as his three predecessors. Randy follows in the footsteps of his close friend and fellow NDHSCA Executive Committee member, Dave Dougherty (2011-2012), to become NHSACA President. As the assistant to the NDHSCA Executive Secretary, Randy's duties primarily include administration of the Longevity Program, recording secretary for all NDHSCA Executive Committee meetings and NDHSCA Annual Business meetings, electronic distribution of all Association communications and recording and distribution of materials at the Annual NDHSCA Convention. NDHSCA Executive Committee Adopts On-Line Registration

The NDHSCA Executive Committee passed a motion at its July meeting to implement usage of online Registration beginning with the 2013-2014 Membership year. The online registration will allow coaches to have



instant registration and to facilitate usage of credit cards for payment. Online registration will allow for last minute registration and will enhance ease for coaches to complete the form.

In that the registrations will be an additional cost item, the membership fee will be increased from \$55 to \$60 for annual registration. The form will not be placed on the website until after the

NDHSCA March Executive Committee to prevent registration complications with registration for the 2012-2013 membership. Reminders will be issued periodically by email.

Rod Oksendahl is a long time football coach is North Dakota. Coach Oksendahl is a native of Maddock. ND where

graduated from high school in 1969. In 1973 he graduated from Valley City State University. He has been a head football coach for 33 years. Coach Oksendahl began his career in Wyndmere, ND where he spent three years. His next 28 years were at Cavalier (ND) High School.

Oksendahl was instrumental in building one of the strongest high school football programs in North Dakota while he was in Cavalier. During the last four years at Cavalier, his teams put together a 47 game winning streak. Presently, he is coaching the Fargo Shanley Deacons. In 2012 his Deacons played in their second State Championship game to become State Champions this year. Rod's teams have played in 11 State Championship games, winning five of them. His overall coaching record is 278-79.

Coach Oksendahl has received seven NDHSCA Coach of the Year awards and two North Dakota Associated Press High School Male Coach of the Year. He was inducted into the NDHSCA Hall of Fame in 1997 and was NHSACA National Coach of the Year Finalist in 2005. Valley City State University named him as recipient of its Distinguished Alumni Award in 2004.

Rod has coached the North Dakota Shrine All Star Football game six times, twice as head coach. He has also coached the Knights of Columbus Montana-Dakota All Star game four times, twice as head coach.

Rod and his wife, Joan, reside in Fargo, ND. They have three children: Todd, Tara (Jeremy) DuBord and Timothy (Karlee). They have two grandchildren: Mathieson and Preston DuBord.

Leland Opp is a native of Hazen, ND and was a longtime girls' track & field coach at Hazen High School.



Coach Opp started his coaching career at Hazen High School in 1986. He was the head girls' coach for 21 years after serving as an assistant coach for two years. He also was head boys' and girls' cross-country coach for eight years, head girls' basketball coach for two years and assistant boys' basketball for nine years.

Coach Opp's track & field teams have won seven State Championships and one State Runner up Title together with 20 regional titles. During his career of coaching girls' track & field, his teams defeated 4,482 teams while only 475 teams defeated Hazen. In cross-country, his teams won one State Championship title and four State Runners up Titles with a career record of 50-39. His girls' basketball teams had a 3rd place finish and one regional title in two years. His career record was 46-4.

Opp was chosen as NDHSCA Girls' Track & Field State Coach of the Year eight times and Regional Coach of the Year 17 times. He was also awarded NDHSCA State Coach of the Year in Cross-country once and Regional Coach of the Year three times. Leland's girls' track & field teams were named the North Dakota Associated Press Sportscasters and Sportswriters Female High School Team of the Year twice. He was awarded the Hazen Chamber of Commerce Community Leadership Awards twice. In 2011 Leland was named the NHSACA Girls' Track & Field National Coach of the Year and was inducted into the NDHSCA Hall of Fame.

The NDHSCA-Gelaine Orvik \$1,000 scholarship honors a North Dakota High School Graduating Senior, who will attend a North Dakota College or University with the intention of becoming a High School Coach. The Scholarship will be awarded for the first time in 2013.

The NDHSCA-Gelaine Orvik \$1,000 Scholarship was established in 2008 when Joe Howell, Lisbon High School Track & Field Coach made a motion to establish the scholarship to honor Gelaine Orvik. Coach Orvik is a 35-year veteran coach who has also served the North Dakota High School Coaches Association since 1974. As a gesture to enhance his motion, Coach Howell made an initial donation of \$100 to establish this Scholarship Fund. The Scholarship Recipient will be a student-athlete who best exemplifies the values and ideals modeled by Coach Orvik, as teacher and coach; those values and ideals he expected from his athletes and students; and those values, ideals and principles he urges all coaches to portray.

The Scholarship

The NDHSCA-Gelaine Orvik \$1,000 Scholarship Fund has been enhanced by other donations from coaches, coaches' friends and sportswear companies. Extraordinary donations are made annually by coaches as they register for the Annual NDHSCA Convention and/or for Annual NDHSCA Membership. Universal Athletics has made a concerted effort to readily donate at the Annual Taco Social at the NDHSCA Convention. Coach Gelaine Orvik

Coach Orvik led the Fargo South High School Bruins for thirty years as Track & Field head coach. During that time South High School won six outdoor state championships and three official state-sponsored indoor championships. Orvik's philosophy of Bruin's Track and Field boasts a tradition of large numbers of participants – usually about 125 boys from grades 9-12 competed each year. Every athlete knew the importance of his performance and of his teammates and made teamwork the driving force in the program. Coach Orvik orchestrated a similar program while he was head cross-country coach for the Bruins. The cross-country runners were committed to being the strongest and best prepared athletes through dedication to hard work. This preparation led the Bruins to the school's first Cross-Country State Championship in 1985.

Mr. Orvik is a graduate of Kloten (ND) High School and Mayville State University. He holds a Bachelors of Science Degree in Education with a double major in English and Physical Education. Orvik retired from teaching in 2001 after completing his 36th years as an educator (teacher/coach) in North Dakota with 33 of those years spent at Fargo South High School. Coach Orvik had a burning desire for every student, athlete, and cohort to succeed. He has led North Dakota Coaches with that same drive and enthusiasm to succeed the right way (with class and professionalism).

Numerous awards and honors have been bestowed on Mr. Orvik ranging from his, community, church, school and university. In May 2005 Fargo Public Schools named the track at Fargo South High School *Orvik Track*. The ceremony marked Gelaine's final chapter at Fargo South High as his academic and athletic achievements were summed up by the following quote. "The athletic track was named after Orvik, but his interactions with the students were his real legacy."

If you are completing the victory milestone for the first time, make sure to give your record for each year. Report only the highest level of coaching each season. Don't add coaching seasons together (ex. if a coach is coaching both jr. high boys basketball and varsity basketball, count only the varsity basketball record for that season). If coaching both varsity girls' and varsity boys' basketball, count each season



on separate forms and don't add together as one record. Under the new format for counting victories in certain sports such as track and field, cross country, tennis, golf, swimming, and gymnastics; the old records will need to be updated. Remember to keep each sport season separate and always report the highest level of coaching in each sport.

Procedure For Determining Won/Loss Records In An Invitational Meet:

- A. In an invitational meet, the teams that finish below you will count as victories, those that finish above you are losses. Any teams that you tie will count as a win.
- B. Figure out the total number of teams you have competed against and what percentage of those teams were wins and losses.
- C. Take the percentage of wins/losses from above and multiply it against the number of meets you participated in to arrive at your won/loss record for the season.
- D. If this is not a whole number, victories will always be rounded down and losses will be rounded up. (Obviously, if your team has participated in ten meets during the year, your wins plus losses should equal ten.)
