NHSACA Hall of Fame Inductee

Induction ceremony will take place June 2017, East Peoria, Illinois

Our National High School Athletics Association Hall of Fame selection, **Scott Grochow**, grew up in Anamoose, North Dakota, where he attended both grade school and high school graduating in 1981 with a class of sixteen. Scott participated in football, basketball and track while in high school. Scott went on

to graduate from Minot State College where he graduated in 1986 with majors in Mathematics and Computer Science. During his collegiate years, he competed in both football as an offensive lineman, and track and field as a thrower.

Grochow's first teaching and coaching position was in Turtle Lake, North Dakota. While at Turtle Lake-Mercer high school he taught eighth grade through senior math, and served as an assistant varsity football coach, Jr high boys' basketball coach, and head girls track coach.

Scott got married the summer after he taught at Turtle Lake-Mercer HS to Kerry Hanson, and they moved to Rugby, North Dakota, in the fall of 1987 to begin teaching and coaching at Rugby High School. He taught high school mathematics, in Rugby for the next thirty years. He started out in 1987 as assistant football, assistant boys' basketball, and assistant boys' track coach.

Scott took over the head football job in 1991 and served as its head coach through the 2016 season. He served as the assistant boys' basketball coach during two different stints covering 20 years. He took over the head boys track & field coach for the Panthers in 1995 and still holds that position. He has also served as the Rugby Athletic Director since in 1999

Coach Grochow was elected to the North Dakota High School Coaches Association Executive Committee in 2004, serving a five-year term, which included one year as President of the NDHSCA in 2006. He became an Assistant Executive Secretary in 2014. He also served on the Class B Boys Track & Field Advisory Committee for the North Dakota High School Activities Association for three separate terms totaling twelve years of service and on the Football Advisory Committee two separate terms totaling eight years.

Scott Grochow coached on three Class B State Championship Boys Track & Field teams, and two State Runner-up teams. His track teams won 19 Region Championships in 21 years; Scott had two Class AA football teams finish state runner up and had four others make the state semifinals. His peers selected Scott as Region Boys' Track & Field Coach of the Year fifteen times and State Class B Boys' Track & Field Coach of the Year three times. He was also elected region football coach of the year six times and state coach of the year twice. He was also named region AD of the year five times. Scott has been a finalist for National Boys Track & Field Coach of the Year two times. In 2014, Scott was named National Boys Track & Field Coach of the Year and was inducted into the North Dakota Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

Scott and his wife, Kerry, have two children: Kaycee and Mitch, who are also both coaches in North Dakota.

Julie Stavn grew up in Harvey, ND and attended school there, graduating from Harvey High School in 1972. She graduated from Minot State College in 1976 with a double major in physical education and recreation and a minor in special education. Julie earned a Master's Degree from University of North Dakota in 1982.

Julie's first teaching and coaching position was in Bismarck, ND at Simle Junior High where she taught 9th grade physical education and coached girls basketball and gymnastics. In 1978, Julie transferred to Bismarck High School to teach physical education and coach. Julie's coaching positions included Head Girls Swimming and Diving, Head Girls Volleyball and Assistant Girls Track & Field. During this time, her swimming and diving teams won three Region runner-up titles and one State runner-up title.

After taking a year of sabbatical leave (1981-82) Julie returned to Bismarck to teach and coach at Century High School. She taught high school physical education for the next 32 years. Julie became the Head Girls Cross Country coach in 1983 and continues in that position today (34 years). In Coach Stavn's first year at Century she was also an Assistant Girls Track & Field coach. The next season she took the head position and was the Patriots Head Track & Field coach from 1984-1988, and then again from 1992-2008(22 years). In 2013 Coach Stavn returned to track & field as an assistant coach.

Stavn coached one Class A State Championship in Cross Country (2014) and three runner-up finishes (2012,13, 16). Her teams won four region championships and were the WDA runner-up team seven times. Coach Stavn's peers selected her as West Region Coach of the Year on several occasions and State Class A Girls Cross Country Coach of the Year four times. Coach Stavn has also been a finalist for National Girls Cross Country Coach of the Year two times.

In girls Track and Field, "Stav" coached two Class A State Championships (1999, 2008) and two runner-up finishes (2004, 08). Her teams won one West Region championship and were the WDA runner-up team five times. Coach Stavn's peers selected her as West Region Coach of the Year on many occasions and State Class A Girls Track & Field Coach of the Year four times. She was also part of two state championships and one runner-up finish as an assistant coach. Coach Stavn has also been a finalist for National Girls Track & Field Coach of the Year two times.

In 2009, Julie was inducted into the North Dakota High School Coaches Association Hall of Fame, joining her husband Rockie as the first husband/wife inductees. She was also inducted into the North Dakota Track & Field Hall of Fame in the spring of 2013. In 2014, Julie was named the North Dakota Girls Cross Country Coach of the year by the US Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches Association.

Julie was elected to the North Dakota High School Coaches Association Executive Committee in 1996, serving a five-year term which included one year as president of the NDHSCA (98-99). She also served on both the cross country and track & field Advisory Committees for the North Dakota High School Activities Association.

In the spring of 2013, after thirty-six years of teaching, Julie retired from the classroom. She continues as the Head Cross Country coach and Assistant Track & Field coach at Century High School.

Julie and her husband, Rockie, have three sons, Thad, Rockie II and Tanner, and three grand-children.

NDHSCA 2017 VICE PRESIDENT CANDIDATES

The two candidates will be Tim Wallstrum, currently the Head Volleyball Coach at Kenmare High School and Perry Piatz, currently the Boys' Golf Coach, Girls' Basketball Coach, and Athletic Director at Kindred High School.



Tim Wallstrum is a graduate of Kenmare High School and the University of North Coach Wallstrum is a 34-year coaching veteran. In those 34 years, he has been named State Volleyball Coach of twice. the Year National High School Athletic Coaches

Association National Coach of the Year Finalist three times and Regional Volleyball Coach of the Year eight times. Tim has also served on the Volleyball Advisory Board, Co-Chair for All-Star Optimist Volleyball, and the Volleyball Sport Chair for the National High School Athletic Coaches Association.

Coach Wallstrum has also coached girls' basketball and baseball. Tim and his wife Ruth have three children: Kira, Grey, and Beca.

Perry Piatz is a graduate of Napoleon High School and Valley City State University. Coach Piatz is a 31-year coaching veteran. He has coached boys' basketball and girls' basketball, golf and has also been an Athletic Director. Perry has



been named the State Golf Coach of the Year three times, Regional Golf Coach of the Year eleven times, Regional Basketball Coach of the Year four times, and District Coach of the Year six times. He was also a finalist for the National High School Athletic Coaches Association Golf Coach of the Year once.

Perry and his wife Sandi have two children Alexis and Peyton.





Nationally Recognized NDHSCA Convention Speaker One of Our Own



We are pleased announce that North Dakota native, Joey C. Eisenmann will be a featured speaker at the 2017 summer NDHSCA Coaches Convention. Dr. Eisenmann's areas expertise include assessment

growth and maturation, youth fitness, pediatric obesity, pediatric exercise physiology, and the young athlete and sport performance.

After high school at Washburn, Eisenmann earned a BS degree in Exercise Science at Mayville State University, a MS in Exercise Science at Northern Arizona University and a PHD Kinesiology/Pediatric Exercise Physiology from Michigan State University in 2000. He is currently a research scientist in auxology (the study of human growth). Eisenmann has published 140 scientific papers and has lectured throughout the country. His focus is on how children grow and mature physically, how the body changes in size and composition (muscle mass, body fat, & bones) during childhood and adolescence, physical capacities (strength, aerobic capacity, etc.) change with

age and during puberty, and how these physical traits are related to health indicators (obesity, cardiovascular health) and physical or sports performance.

Dr. Joey Eisenmann has held faculty positions at the University of Wyoming, York University, Iowa State University, and Michigan State University. He has served as the senior clinical and translational research scientist at Helen DeVos Children's Hospital. He continued his research with Dr. Joe Carlson at MSU College of Osteopathic Medicine in child growth, composition, and the cardio-metabolic health of young people. He also developed a collaborative program between Spartan Performance and MSU Sports Medicine and Rehabilitation Medicine to improve the health and performance of young athletes, including an innovative sports performance program. He is also involved in several national level projects involving pediatric exercise medicine. The combination of Dr. Eisenmann's academic knowledge, practical experience in youth sports, understanding the science of sports training and pediatrics gives him a unique understanding of the young athlete. We look forward to hearing him share his knowledge at the summer 2017 convention July 25-28 at the Mandan Baymont Inn and Suites.



2017 NDHSCA Hall of Fame Inductees

The NDHSCA Executive Committee voted unanimously at the Fall Meeting to induct four coaches into the **North Dakota High School Coaches Association Hall of Fame** during the summer convention. The inductees are as follows:

Steve Miller, retired Head Boys' Basketball Coach from Bismarck High School Brad Sandy, retired Head Football and Track and Field Coach from Harvey High School Lisa Strand, Head Volleyball Coach at Thompson High School Kent Van Ells, Head Gymnastics Coach at Dickinson High School




Steve Miller coached for 38 years with the last 25 years at Bismarck High School as the Head Boys' Basketball coach. His coaching career started at Napoleon High School. He was a graduate assistant at the University of North Dakota before moving to Richardton High School and then finishing at Bismarck High School. In Steve's 38 years of coaching he had two District Titles and one Regional Title in Girls' Basketball, one District Title, three Regional Runner-up Titles, thirteen Regional Titles, six State Runner-up Titles, and six State Titles in Boys' Basketball. Coach Miller accomplished 37 Girls Basketball Victories and 541 Boys' Basketball Victories throughout his career. Steve was named State Coach of the Year three times, coached the Lions' All Star Boys Basketball game eleven times, National High

School Athletic Coaches Association National Coach of the Year Finalist twice, and was named the North Dakota Associated Press Sportscasters and Sportswriters Male Coach of the Year once.

Coach Miller served the association on the Boys' Basketball Advisory Committee for three years and presented at the North Dakota High School Coaches Association State Coaching Convention as a clinician a few times.

Steve and his wife, Denise, reside in Bismarck.

Brad Sandy coached for 34 years. He was at Turtle Lake-Mercer, Bottineau and finished his career at Harvey High School. Brad's teams accomplished eight Regional Runner-up Titles, seven Regional Titles, two State Runner-up Titles, and three State Titles in football, one Regional Runner-up Title and three Regional Titles in Boys' Track and Field, and two Regional Runner-up Titles in Girls' Track and Field. Coach Sandy obtained 196 Football coaching victories, 120 Boys' Track and Field coaching victories and 65 Girls' Track and Field coaching victories. Brad coached the North Dakota Shrine Football Game six times and the Mon-Dak Football game four times. He was the NDHSCA State Football Coach of



the Year twice, the Regional Football Coach of the Year three times, State Boys' Track and Field Coach of the Year once and a National Federation Coach of the year one time.

Coach Sandy served the association on the Football Advisory Committee for four years and a regional representative for All State Football numerous years. Brad was also a clinician at the NDHSCA Annual Convention.

Brad and his wife, Sally, have four children: Elizabeth, Blair, Brock, and Bryan.


Lisa Strand has been coaching at Thompson High School for 28 years. She is currently the Head Volleyball Coach. Coach Strand has also coached Girls' Basketball, Track and Field, and Softball. Lisa's teams have won six Conference Titles, nine District Titles, five Regional Runner-up Titles, twelve Regional Titles, one State Runner-up and four State Titles in Volleyball. Her teams have also won two Conference Titles, two District Titles, two Regional Runner-up Titles, and two Regional Titles in Girls' Basketball. Her volleyball teams have amassed 829 victories and her girls' basketball teams 118 victories. Coach Strand was the Optimist Volleyball Coach six times, District Coach of the Year four times, Regional Coach of the Year seven times and the State Coach of the Year twice in Volleyball.

Lisa was also given the North Dakota High School Coaches Association Certificate of Merit twice, Regional Girls' Basketball Coach of the Year once, North Dakota Associated Press Sportscasters and Sportswriters Female Coach of the Year once and the National High School Athletic Coaches Association National Coach of the Year Finalist twice.

Coach Strand has served her association on the Volleyball Advisory Committee for three years and as Co-Chair of the Optimist Volleyball All Star Match. She also served on a North Dakota High School Activities Association Ad Hoc Committee. Lisa was an Executive Board Member of the NDHSCA for five years serving as President in 2014. Coach Strand is currently an Assistant Executive Secretary to the NDHSCA as the Dakota Coach Editor.

Sport Specialization Injury Rates Higher for Athletes That Specialize in One Sport

Permission has been obtained to reprint the following article which was provided by <u>Training and Conditioning</u> as a press release to the NFHS. The article contains the results of a study conducted to determine if athletes that are specializing in one sport are at greater risk of injury

A study conducted by the University of Wisconsin School of Medicine and Public Health and funded by the National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) Foundation revealed that high school athletes who specialize in a single sport sustain lower-extremity injuries at significantly higher rates than athletes who do not specialize in one sport.

The study was conducted throughout the 2015-16 school year at 29 high schools in Wisconsin involving more than 1,500 student-athletes equally divided between male and female participants. The schools involved in the study represented a mixture of rural (14), suburban (12) and urban (3) areas, and enrollments were equally diverse with 10 small schools (less than 500 students), 10 medium schools (501-1,000 students) and nine large schools (more than 1,000 students).



Athletes who were specializing in one sport were twice as likely to report previously sustaining a lower-extremity injury while participating in sports (46%) than athletes who did not specialize (24%). In addition, specialized athletes sustained 60 percent more new lower-extremity injuries during the study than athletes who did not specialize. Lower-extremity injuries were defined as any acute, gradual, recurrent, or repetitive-use injury to the lower musculoskeletal system.

"While we have long believed that sport specialization by high school athletes leads to an increased risk of overuse injury, this study confirms those beliefs about the potential risks of sport

specialization," said Bob Gardner, NFHS executive director. "Coaches, parents and student-athletes need to be aware of the injury risks involved with an overemphasis in a single sport."

Among those who reported previously sustaining a lower-extremity injury, the areas of the body injured most often were the ankle (43%) and knee (23%). The most common type of previous injuries were ligament sprains (51%) and muscle/tendon strains (20%).

New injuries during the year-long study occurred most often to the ankle (34%), knee (25%), and upper leg (13%), with the most common injuries being ligament sprains (41%), muscle/tendon strains (25%), and tendonitis (20%).

In addition, specialized athletes were twice as likely to sustain a gradual onset/repetitive-use injury than athletes who did not specialize, and those who specialized were more likely to sustain an injury even when controlling for gender, grade, previous injury status, and sport.

Thirty-four (34) percent of the student-athletes involved in the Wisconsin study specialized in one sport, with females (41%) more likely to specialize than males (28%). Soccer had the highest level of specialization for both males (45%) and females (49%). After soccer, the rate of specialization for females was highest for softball (45%), volleyball (43%), and basketball (37%). The top specialization sports for males after soccer were basketball (37%), tennis (33%), and wrestling (29%).

The study, which was directed by Timothy McGuine, PhD, ATC, of the University of Wisconsin, also documented the effects of concurrent sport participation (participating in an interscholastic sport while simultaneously participating in an out-of-school club sport), which indicated further risk of athletes sustaining lower-extremity injuries.

Almost 50 percent of the student-athletes involved in the survey indicated they participated on a club team outside the school setting, and 15 percent of those individuals did so while simultaneously competing in a different sport within the school. Seventeen (17) percent of the student-athletes indicated that they took part in 60 or more primary sport competitions (school and club) in a single year. Among those student-athletes in this group who sustained new lower-extremity injuries during the year, 27 percent were athletes who specialized in one sport.

The student-athletes involved in the study were deemed "specialized" if they answered "yes" to at least four of the following six questions: 1) Do you train more than 75 percent of the time in your primary sport?; 2) Do you train to improve skill and miss time with friends as a result?; 3) Have you quit another sport to focus on one sport?; 4) Do you consider your primary sport more important than your other sports?; 5) Do you regularly travel out of state for your primary sport?; 6) Do you train more than eight months a year in your primary sport?

Although some sports (field hockey, lacrosse) are not offered in Wisconsin and were not included in the study, the study concluded that since specialization increased the risk of lower-extremity injuries in sports involved in the survey it would also likely increase the risk of injuries in sports that were not a part of the study.



- Strive to develop in each athlete the qualities of leadership, initiative and good judgment
- For interscholastic competition, will dress in an appropriate manner that distinguishes the coach as a professional, representing his school and team

- Provide a safe environment for practice and competition.
- Gain an awareness of the importance of prevention, care and treatment of athletic injuries.
- Respect the integrity and judgment of the game official.
- Teach and abide by the rules of the game in letter and in spirit.
- Build and maintain ethical relationships with coaches and administrators.
- Strive for excellence in coaching skills and techniques through professional improvement.
- Promote personal fitness and good nutrition.
- Be modest in victory and gracious in defeat.
- Encourage a healthy respect for the overall athletic program and its vital roles in education.
