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Message from the NDHSCA President Eric Olson

"Why do I coach?"

Greetings from the NDHSCA. It's the time of year where we have an opportunity to sit down and give thanks for all our blessings around us. I hope you and your family had a chance to do that during the holiday season.

I want to remind coaches their responsibility of being part of the NDHSCA, in which our Code of Ethics can be found on page 29 of this newsletter. At the top of the list is to "exemplify the highest moral character, behavior and leadership." We expect North Dakota Coaches to be the leaders in our craft and have the responsibility to provide the character and leadership skills we want the youth of our state to follow. As I tell my class of 5th graders at North Sargent: "Work hard to impress someone today!"

What I Know Now That I Wish I Knew Then

Remember being young, confident, and trusting—believing that you have the knowledge and means to handle every situation? Ah, the joy of ignorance! Life is learning from experiences and using that knowledge for future success. Some parts of life would be much easier and more productive if one had all the prudent knowledge from the start, and



coaching falls into that category. Fortunately, young coaches learn from the veterans who have experienced the battles that all coaches must wage. I have been fortunate to learn from some of the best coaches—my own and my colleagues. Another advantage I have had is that I experienced being a rookie coach twice. After coaching for five years, I took a twelve-year hiatus to have three children and raise them to the point of semi-self-sufficiency (the jury is still deliberating on the proficiency level of those said children) before returning to the coaching ranks. I was granted a 'do over' as a new head coach in the same program I once headed—only this time, I had five years' worth of knowledge to tap. Even though I had tremendous mentors, some knocks I had to learn on my own. That being said, as I look back on my years of coaching, I realize that I know now many tricks of the trade I wish I knew when I began.

One 'thing' I wish I would have known when I started coaching [or, to be honest one thing I wish I would have accepted] was my inability to remember everything. I wished I would have taken meticulous notes about practice, weather, competitions, and all other aspects of the season. Today, I can peruse my many notebooks and know the workout for every day since my return to coaching. I know if we had a blizzard, driving rain, or even miraculous sunshine for practice and how that affected practice/ competition. I know how the athletes recovered and performed after a workout and how prom affected performance. I know when athletes peaked—or should have if Mother Nature had been on board with competition weather. Taking these notes are easy and quick, but more importantly, they are essential for my current practice plans each week. Having those notes gives me options—without reinventing the wheel—for each of my athletes. More importantly, I have the data I need to evaluate the season and adjust for future success.

My next 'I wish I knew' is one that took me a long time to learn. As a matter of fact, it is still something I need to master: delegating. I have been blessed with amazing assistant coaches who make me look good, but I don't always use all my resources. Assistant coaches are one's assistants for reason—to assist. Many times head coaches feel the need for total control. [According to my husband, being a control freak is part of my DNA.] As coaches, we have a tremendous amount of work—that which most of us consider mundane—paperwork outside of practice and competition, so delegating some of that to our assistants is essential for success and sanity. Don't be afraid to give assistants tasks such as being the webmaster, running the Remind app, maintaining records, checking eligibility, etc. Taking one of the items that do not directly involve coaching athletes off my plate allows for more quality time with athletes.

Finally, the last piece of advice I have for young coaches is an epiphany for all young coaches. Never assume common sense reigns. I have learned no matter how obvious something is to me, it is not to teenagers. Their brains are an entity all their own; hence, they provide constant entertainment and occasional frustration.

They are so busy growing and stuffing their heads with academics that they sometimes miss the aspects we would once consider common sense. Cover all your bases—think "What would a teen think?" and head off any

problems by explaining EXACTLY what is expected of them in school, out of school, at practice, at competition, and everywhere in between. I have found if I am clear with my expectations, few, if any, problems arise, and if they do, I have my resources in place.

Twenty-five years ago, I may have moved around the track more quickly, but today, I am much more efficient. Many of those "learn by doing" experiences in the field of coaching are truly valuable, but if I can save some time and energy for someone else, all the better. Someday, I hope to be among the ranks of the knowledgeable veterans of our field, but for now, I will keep plugging away at what I love and use my many resources to become better with each season.

Good luck with this winter season and remember each challenge brings its own chance to learn and reap ultimate rewards.

Dean Winczewski is a graduate of Minot Bishop Ryan High School, Minot State University and Valley City State University. Coach Winczewski is a 20-year coaching veteran. In those 20 years, he has been named the State Boys Basketball Coach of the Year twice, West Region Coach of the Year three times and USA Today North Dakota Coach of the Year three times. Dean has also been a nominee for the National High School Athletic Coaches Association Coach of the Year. He served six-years on the Boys' Basketball Advisory Board. Coach Winczewski has acquired a 276-134 win-loss record in basketball. His teams have won five State Titles.

He has also coached football, girls' basketball and track and field. Dean and his wife Jackie have three children: Andrew, Aric and Alex.



Ron Metz is a graduate of Carson High School and Dickinson State University. Coach Metz is a 30-year coaching veteran. In those 30 years, he has been named the State Coach of the Year three times and West Region Coach of the Year twice. Ron has also been a nominee for the National High School Athletic Coaches Association Coach of the Year. He has served six years on the Girls' Basketball Advisory Board. Coach Metz has a win-loss record of 323-113. His teams have won three State Titles.

National Hall of Fame Inductees

Recently the NDHSCA Executive Board unanimously voted to induct Dan Carr and Gary Schauer into the NHSACA Hall of Fame. The ceremony will take place in June at the National Convention in Sioux Falls, SD. Congratulations to Gary and Dan.



Dan Carr

Dan Carr is a graduate of Verndale (MN) High School; he earned an Associate of Arts Degree from Central Lakes Community College (MN) and his BS Degree from Mayville State University (ND). He earned his Master's Degree from North Dakota State University. Dan began his professional coaching career in 1977 at Mayville State University as an Assistant Men's Basketball Coach. He moved to Belgrade (MN) High School in 1978 and was the head boys' basketball coach and head track and field coach. In 1981 Coach Carr became head boys' basketball coach at Linton High School (ND) where he remains today, except for a one year stay at NDSU as Graduate Assistant for Men's Basketball while he worked on his MS Degree. Dan later added head boys and girls golf to his coaching responsibilities at Linton High School.

Coach Carr has been a leader in his profession as Class B Representatives to the NDHSCA Advisory Committee to NDHSAA (1996-1999). He has served as NDHSCA Lions All Star Basketball Regional Player selection committee for eleven years. He has served

as Conference Scheduling Committee Chairman for three years and several times chaired the District and Regional Coach of the Year Committee. Carr has been a clinician for the NDHSCA Coaches Convention twice. He has also been a clinician for the NHSACA National Coaches Convention four times.

Dan Carr's coaching has a 40-year span with two years as a college coach. He has guided his high school boys' basketball teams to 720 victories during his 38-year tenure. Carr has coached his Linton basketball teams to 22 Conference Titles and 18 District Titles. Linton Boys' Basketball Teams have also been Region Runner-up titlists eight times and Regional Champions eleven times. The Linton Lions Boys' Basketball Teams have also been NDHSAA State Runner-up titlists once (1987) and State Champions three times (1984, 1985 & 2009). Coach Carr has mentored his boys' golf team to a Regional Championship and his girls' golf teams to ten Conference Titles and eight Regional Championships.

Carr's coaching has resulted in his being selected NDHSCA Boys' Basketball District Coach of the Year fourteen times and NDHSCA Regional Coach of the Year seven times. He has also been named NDHSCA Boys' Basketball State Coach of the Year two times (1984 and 2005). He has selected for these awards by his peers at each level. He has also named Girls' Golf Regional Coach of the Year 7 times and State Girls Golf Coach of the Year in 1995.


Dan's 1984-1985 team earned him High School Male Team Coach of the Year by the North Dakota Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association. Dan has coached the NDHSCA Lions All Star Basketball Team four times (1984, 1985, 1987, and 2009). He was named National Federation State Coach of the Year in 2003 and 2007. Dan was nominated for National High School Athletic Coaches Association Boys' Basketball coach of the Year in 2004, 2008, 2011, and 2014. He was chosen by the NHSACA Selection Committee as NHSACA Boys' Basketball Coach of the Year Finalist in each of these four years. He earned NHSACA Boys' Basketball National Coach of the Year in 2014.

Coach Carr was named to the Central Lakes Community College (Brainerd, MN) Athletic Hall of Fame in 2003. Carr was also named to the Mayville State University Coaches Hall of Fame in 2013 and the North Dakota High School Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2015. In 2016, Carr became the winningest coach in North Dakota basketball history.

Dan continues to coach and teach in Linton, ND. He and his wife, Anne, have four children: Katie, Lacey, Kyle and Megan and four grandchildren: Carter, Easton, Jaxon and Josie.

National Hall of Fame Inductee

Gary Schauer



Gary coached a total of 42 years throughout his career in the following schools; Bowden (74-78) Esmond (78-76) Bismarck (86-93) Ashley (93-95) Langdon (95-09) Edgley-Kulm (09-14) and South Border (15-17). He coached several sports including varsity football, track and field, boys' basketball, girls' basketball, and cross country.

While coaching girls' basketball he earned a total of 550 wins, with eleven district titles, ten regional titles, three state runner-up finishes and two state

championships which occurred at Bismarck High School in 1991 and Langdon High School in 2005. Gary was also honored with the opportunity to coach the Lion's All Star game five times. He was voted Regional Coach of the Year five times, State Coach of the Year three times and was selected as a National Coach of the Year finalist three times.

During his time coaching boys' basketball he won a total of 277 games with two district titles, one regional title and one third place finish at the state tournament. Gary was voted as Regional Coach of the Year one time.

While coaching girl's track and field, Gary acquired two regional titles. He was selected as Regional Coach of the Year one time and State Coach of the Year one time.

Gary started the cross country program at Langdon High School in 1998 with the help of Rodger Snortland. Later that same year, they finished as regional champions and state runners up and Gary was selected as Regional Coach of the Year.

Gary served on the North Dakota High School Coaches executive committee from 1991-1996, while serving as president from 1993-94.

Gary would also like to mention that none of the accomplishments previously listed would be possible without the support of his lovely wife Linda, whom is currently the pastor at Zion Lutheran at Ashley, North Dakota. They have two kids, Christy and Eric. Gary also has a daughter, Heidi.

2018 NDHSCA Hall of Fame Inductees

The NDHSCA Executive Committee voted unanimously at the Fall Meeting to induct four coaches into the North Dakota High School Coaches Association Hall of Fame. The inductees are as follows:

- Brian Anderson; Head Cross Country and Track and Field Coach from New Town High School
- Clint Chamberlain; Retired Cross Country and Track and Field Coach from Williston High School
- Gregg Grinsteinner; Head Boys Basketball Coach from Dickinson Trinity High School
- Randy Johnson; Head Boys Track and Field Coach from Hazen High School



Brian Anderson has coached for 44 years, the last 15 at New Town High School. His coaching career started at Maple Valley as an Assistant Football Coach, Head Boys' Basketball Coach and Head Boys' and Girls' Track and Field Coach. He continued his coaching career at Litchville, Watford City, Valley City and is currently coaching at New Town High School as the Head Boys' and Girls' Cross Country Coach as well as the Head Boys' and Girls' Track and Field Coach. In Coach Anderson's 44 years of coaching he holds Region Runner-Up Titles six times in Boys' Track and Field, four times in Girls' Cross Country, two times in Boys' Basketball, one time in Boys' Cross Country and one time in Boys Golf. His teams have won the Regional Championship thirteen times in Boys' Cross Country, five times in Boys' Track and Field, four times in Boys' Basketball and two times in Girls' Cross Country. Brian's teams have also accomplished State Runner-Up Titles two times in Boys' Cross Country, two time in Girls' Cross Country and one time in Boys' Track and Field.

Additionally, his teams have won the State Championship twelve times in Boys' Cross Country, four times in Boys' Track and Field, one time in Boys' Basketball and one time in Girls' Cross Country. Coach Anderson has 412 Boys Basketball victories. He was named the National High School Athletic Coaches Association Boys' Cross Country National Coach of the Year in 2017. Brian also has been named State Coach of the Year in Boys' Cross Country eight times, Boys' Track and Field twice, Boys' Golf once and the North Dakota Sportscasters and Sportswriters Male Coach of the Year once.

Coach Anderson has served his association on Boys' Basketball Advisory for four years, Boys' Cross Country Advisory four years and the North Dakota High School Coaches Association Executive Board for five years, serving as President in 1998. He has also been a clinician at the State Convention and National Convention numerous times.

Brian and his wife Shelley have three children: Molly, Scott and Paige.

Clint Chamberlain coached for 41 years. He started his career at Minot High School and finished it out at Williston High School. Clint's Track and Field teams accomplished two Regional Runner Up Titles. His Girls' Cross Country Teams finished with one Regional Runner-Up Title and one State Runner-Up Title. Coach Chamberlain's Boys' Cross Country Teams finished with six Regional Runner-Up Titles, seven Regional Titles, six State Runner-Up Titles, and four State Championships. His teams won 16 dual and triangular meets while winning 134 multiteam meets. Clint was named State Coach of the Year five times, West Region Coach of the Year twice and a National High School Athletic Coaches Association National Finalist three times. He received Williston's Follow the Leader Award twice and was inducted into the Moorhead State University Hall of Fame.



10 Principles of Successful Coaches

Successful coaches weave these 10 principles into all aspects of their team's activities—whether it be during the off-season or pre-season, or in practice and in games.

Consistent and clear standards and values. Pre-set team values are the foundation for every successful team. What is your team's identity? Great teams establish their own culture.

The team members feel a collective responsibility to learn and follow the team values. People commit to the team values and live it in their actions. "This is the way we do things around here" is something the team members are proud to express. The feeling is that "we don't want to do anything that would let down the coaches, the team and each other". Everyone is accountable.

Master Teachers, Master Motivators. This first way for a coach gain credibility is to respect and trust is how much they know and how well they can teach it. Successful coaches understand the game and their players and how to teach both.

Positive role models. Coaches must consistently display the team values in their actions, and it carries down to the seniors so that they serve as role models for the team values. In a successful program, the freshmen or sophomores can be told, "If you are not sure how hard to work or how to act in any situation, just watch our seniors and follow their lead." Your older players and most talented players must be your best workers.

All roles are valued. When there is relationship-based leadership, everyone who contributes to the team's overall value. Credit is shared. When all roles are valued, players are more willing to accept roles and the team is more successful.

Positive rites of passage. Intentionally created positive traditions provide a path for athletes to feel welcomed, and to grow into leadership roles. Nothing that could be considered hazing is ever present.

Consistent performance feedback. Coaches know how to balance praise and correction. Athletes take correction as a compliment—they are coachable.

Trust. With a successful team, players trust each other and their coaches. They trust their training. Mutual trust among players and coaches allows direct, open, honest communication and fearless play.

Sense of Urgency. There is a high-energy level during both practice and games. Individual and team discipline is visible in the focused attention and focused effort of everyone. Details are important. Only disciplined teams have a chance to win championships.

Impact the player's lives! Players in these programs treasure the experience so much that they carry the lessons and values over beyond the season and into their lives overall. They build successful "teams" of their own—whether it be in sports or other endeavors.





Lifetime Membership

To purchase a Lifetime Membership the prospective coach must have been:

- A North Dakota High School Coaches Association Member for 20 years
- An active high school coach for at least 25 years either in North Dakota or another state

Notes on Lifetime Membership

- Lifetime Membership may be purchased for a one-time fee of \$300. In order to become a Lifetime Member the person must be a member which is \$60. The lifetime Membership fee would be \$360 total.
- Lifetime Membership will carry all Active Membership benefits including \$1,000,000 Liability Insurance coverage
- A Lifetime Member relinquishes voting and office holding privileges if a member is no longer an active coach. If they are active in coaching, voting and office holding privileges continue.



NEW CAMP INSURANCE REQUIREMENT: PARTICIPANT/ACCIDENT COVERAGE

As a member benefit of your coaches' association, your members will continue to have General Liability coverage for their coaching activities (for example, State Association sanctioned All-Star Events, camps, other coaching activities and classroom coverage). The new requirement from the General Liability Company is that if a coach operates/conducts a camp he/she must have Participant/Accident coverage for all participants/campers attending the camp. Your member coach has the option to provide proof of existing Participant/Accident coverage or to purchase the coverage at a discounted rate through the NOCAD Camp Insurance Program.

WHY THE CHANGE?

When a coach is coaching at his/her school, student athletes are always covered by an Accident Insurance Policy that is provided by the school or the High School Association. The coverage is in place to help schools and High School Associations eliminate potential litigation; because when someone is injured, the Participant/Accident Insurance Policy can pay medical bills. Even if the injured party has Primary Medical Insurance, most policies no longer pay 100% of the medical bills and parents could have high out-of-pocket expenses. For example, if a student has a \$50,000 ACL injury and the parents' Primary Medical Insurance Policy has an 80/20 co-pay, the insurance company is going to pay \$40,000 and the parents would have \$10,000 in out-of-pocket expenses.

In today's legal climate, everything possible must be done to protect our General Liability Policy from lawsuits being filed for negligent acts when someone is injured. Camp Liability Policies could be unavailable in the near future if Participant/Accident coverage has not been added.

- Build and maintain ethical relationships with coaches and administrators.
- Strive for excellence in coaching skills and techniques through professional improvement.
