# **SHARE YOUR TALENTS**

Like many of you, I started out coaching very young. I started with basketball when I was just a high school student. Our town had elementary leagues that were sponsored by the local businesses. We had about eight of these teams in our small community. The varsity basketball players were called upon to be the coaches for these young players. I also coached girls' softball and boys' baseball in the summers through college. When I became a high school coach, I thought all I had to do was coach. I did not understand all the work behind the coaching. You have the rules tests, rules clinics, information to get on the websites, parent meetings, district meetings, regional meetings, state meetings, all-star, all-state, and senior athlete of the year nomination forms to get done, endless stats to compile, video to take and review, assistants to organize, and managers to find. All this is just a partial list, and you must do it around your regular job.

Thank goodness there were some veteran coaches around who helped me get the things I needed and advise me through the things I did not know about. One of the best things these mentors did for me was point me in the direction of the North Dakota High School Coaches Association. Here I had access to a wealth of education and experience. Much of it was formal through the conventions offered by the association. However, I was also able to build a network of fellow coaches that provided me with the conversations and support I needed because these other coaches had gone through the same things that I was going through.

All of this made me want to help other coaches as I became a veteran coach myself. To do this, I started to volunteer in the coaches' association and was amazed at all the work that goes on behind the scenes. I was so busy with my own work that I did not fathom all the things that were being done for me. Believe it or not, I did not even know how many people were on the Executive Committee. (There are 10 right now in case you did not know either) I did not even understand the relationship between the North Dakota Coaches Association and the National High School Athletic Coaches Association or that I was a member of the national association by being a member of our association.

The NHSACA is also working hard on our behalf and many North Dakota Coaches have been significant leaders in the progress of the national association. The primary goals of the association are to educate, recognize and support the coaches in our country. They now recognize individuals across the country in 19 athletic categories. The country is divided into 8 regions and nominees are accepted from each of these regions and 8 finalists are then selected to be recognized in each of these categories. This puts about 150 coaches in the spotlight each year. We have nominees from North Dakota in most of these areas every year.

One of the primary concepts that are looked at when these nominees are evaluated is their honors. This includes things like the coach's record, being coach of the year, or being accepted into a hall of fame. Another primary concept is service. There are so many ways to provide service. The executive committee alone rotates through its elected members and needs people to run for vice president each year. We also have

This is the first summer in the history of the North Dakota High School Coaches Association we were not able to hold the State Convention. This means we did not have an election, so our Executive Board will remain the same as last year for the 2020-2021 school year. # 2020 NHSACA NATIONAL CONVENTION REPORT FOR NDHSCA

**Cancellation of National Convention:** The NHSACA Executive Committee held a series of special meetings in March, April and May to evaluate the current information of the effect COVID-19 was having on our nation, Nebraska and the city of Lincoln. On May 7 the Executive Committee voted unanimously to "Postpone" the 2020 NHSACA/NCA National Convention/Clinic to July 26-29, 2021.

**Major Reasons for Postponement rather than Cancellation:** President Schroeder has worked diligently in preparation for this convention and secured financial sponsorships and should be allowed to preside over his national convention. The COTY Finalists and Hall of Fame Inductees, along with the families and friends, deserve to receive the public recognition they will receive during the convention and banquets. The WCA and other Wyoming individuals and groups have made commitments to this convention and these commitments need to be honored.

**Process for Postponement:** All COTY Finalists will carry over to the 2021 convention. The state associations will NOT nominate any new coaches. All Hall of Fame Inductees will carry over to the 2021 convention. Only New Mexico and Louisiana will have the option of nominating coaches for the Hall of Fame (they had not submitted nominees at the time of postponement). Everyone who registered and paid fees for the convention had the choice of receiving a refund for their fees or rolling their payment over to 2021. North Dakota Coaches' registrations will all carryover to 2021 even though registration fees were not paid. This saves the North Dakota coaches the time and effort of reregistering next year.

**2021 Convention:** Dates of the Convention are July 26-29, 2021. The Hall of Fame Banquet will be held on July 28<sup>th</sup> and the COTY Awards Banquet will be held on July 29<sup>th</sup>. The host site is Lincoln North Star High School. The NCA is expecting up to 3,000 coaches to attend this convention. It will include All Star games. There will be some outstanding clinic sessions throughout the week. Numerous hotels have been secured for the convention in the area surrounding LNSHS with shuttle buses running for those who choose not to drive.

# NDHSCA-Gelaine Orvik Scholarship Recipients Selected

The recipients of the annual NDHSCA-Gelaine Orvik \$1,000 Scholarship have been identified and notified for 2020. After evaluation and assessment, the selection committee selected **Taylor Dean** from Stanley High School and **Skyler Strand** from Bismarck High School as beneficiaries. The Scholarships were presented to the two young student/athletes by Gelaine Orvik this summer.

The Scholarship was established in 2008 when Joe Howell, Lisbon High School Track & Field Coach made a motion to establish the scholarship to honor Gelaine Orvik. Coach Orvik is a 35-year veteran coach who also served the North Dakota High School Coaches Association from 1974-2015. The requirements for the Scholarship Recipient are that he or she will be a student-athlete graduate from a North Dakota High School and will attend a North Dakota College or University. The final requisite is that he/she intends to pursue the profession of interscholastic coaching.

The nomination form identifies the criteria used for consideration for selection: GPA, class rank percentile, athletic awards, activity awards, ACT test scores, captain's and leadership roles, an application letter from the applicant, and recommendation letters from faculty, coach and administration. The recipients also best exemplifies the values and ideals modeled by Coach Orvik, as teacher and coach; those values and ideals he expected from his athletes and students; and those same values, ideals and principles he urges all coaches to portray.

The NDHSCA-Gelaine Orvik \$1,000 Scholarship Fund has been developed by donations from coaches, coaches' friends and sportswear companies. Extraordinary donations are made annually by coaches as they register for the Annual NDHSCA Convention and/or for

Annual NDHSCA Membership. Universal Athletics has made a concerted effort to readily donate at the Annual Taco Social at the NDHSCA Convention. Some coaches have made the Scholarship Fund a recipient as a memorial for friends and relatives. SUBWAY also makes an annual \$1,000 donation for a **second NDHSCA-Gelaine Orvik Scholarship**.

**Taylor Dean** was ranked first in her class of 42 at Stanley High School. She earned more than 29 credits when she graduated; she has an ACT test composite of 29 and earned a GPA of 4.00 through seven semesters. Her academic classes include College Credit Classes in calculus, college composition 1 and college speech. Her GPA reflects her college credit classes as well as human anatomy.

Taylor lettered in cross-country as a ninth grader, in track & field as a 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> grader, and in volleyball, basketball, and softball for her four years in high school (although her senior year of softball was eliminated due to Coronavirus). She was a member of FBLA and S-Club for four years and participated in band for two years and Academic Olympics for two years Taylor had also served as a team captain in basketball (three years), volleyball as a senior and in softball as a junior.

**Taylor** was nominated for this scholarship by her basketball and track & field coach, Kelly Roemmich. Kelly was also her math instructor. He praised her scholastically "as a math student . . . who worked hard at completing assignments accurately and in a timely fashion." Kelly added that "Taylor was also a very respectful student and would never be a disruption in class."

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Alecia Pulver additionally declares Taylor's being a respectful student who enjoys a healthy relationship with her peers and adults. She is a positive role model for younger students. Taylor never avoids a challenge and is committed to perseverance and success. In basketball Kelly alluded to her time and effort to improve in the sport. Although she may not have been the fastest athlete, she made up by hustling. Taylor had a superlative work ethic and was the epitome of a student-athlete. Coach Roemmich asserts that Taylor isn't "an in your face leader", but she leads by example and always congratulates teammates when they perform well.

Overall, **Taylor's** recommendations center on her academics, commitment, work-ethic, dedication, and positivity. She is a great leader and student-athlete with a commitment to be a true team person, all of which qualify her as a deserving recipient of the NDHSCA-Gelaine Orvik Scholarship.

**Skyler Strand** graduated first in his class of 282 in a Weighted Class Rank with an ACT test composite score of 27. He had a Weighted GPA of 4.05 with a curriculum that included AP government, AP psychology, AP US History, AP biology and Blended English 12. **Skyler** competed and lettered in hockey and baseball for the four years he attended Bismarck High School. He was a leader and/or a captain in baseball as a junior and hockey as a senior. He was elected to

be the team captain as a senior, but of course the season has been curtailed by the coronavirus pandemic.

**Skyler** was a member of Student Council for three years and senior class president. He was a member of DECA as a 9<sup>th</sup> grader and prom committee as a junior. He was a member of HOSA for three years and National Honor Society his final three years at Bismarck High School. Skyler also served two terms on the State Superintendent's Student Cabinet.

**Skyler** shared that he wanted to become a high school coach because coaches influence athletes and their life decisions. Student-athletes are such vulnerable people as they strive for success. Coaches also serve as positive role-models and as inspirations in how to lead, overcome adversity and be a part of a team. Coaches are constantly imparting leadership skills that influence athletes for their lifetime.

**Skyler** is praised by his baseball coach who has known Skyler as a student, player and coworker. Coach Carr says "Skyler is a hard worker in everything he does." Carr adds that Skyler's "...positive attitude brightens any environment he is in and makes working with him a positive experience." During Skyler's senior hockey season, he endured a season ending injury. Coach shared, "True to Skyler's form, he turned lemons into lemonade by becoming a student assistant coach....because of Skyler's personality, work ethic, and motivation our team had a remarkable successful season."

**Skyler** received similar commendation from his baseball coach. Scott Kinnischtke calls Skyler "a true student of the game." Scott points to Skyler's "...interest in little parts of the sport that many players overlook." Coach Kinnischtke added "Skyler was returning catcher for the Demons; officially the team does not have captains, but make no mistake---Skyler is our leader. His coachability and sportsmanship are both top-notch. He has provided vocal support and is a great role model for the other players on the team, with his calm, collected, analytical nature."

**Skyler** receives complementary accolades from the Bismarck High School Athletic Director. Scott Nustad compliments Skyler "...with being diligent, intelligent and pleasant. Nustad ads "Skyler is enthusiastic, thorough...and demanding of the best from himself." Nustad's final remark is that "Skyler will be a great ambassador for the NDHSCA-Gelaine Orvik –NDHSCA Scholarship's values and commitment to the youth of North Dakota."

Undoubtedly **Skyler's** recommendations center on his academics, leadership, dedication, motivation, responsibility and reliability. # **High School Coaches to Play Key Roles** in Connecting Students This Year

An excerpt from The NFHS Voice:

"The pandemic has revealed many heroes during the past five months – most notably those frontline health-care workers and emergency first responders – but we believe the heroes of the 2020-21 school year will be the thousands of education-based teacher-coaches in our nation's schools.

Re-connecting high school athletes with their coaches, whether that connection is virtually or in-person, is crucial for so many students. In some situations, a coach may be the most significant mentor in a student-athlete's life, so keeping that relationship intact is paramount.

Some coaches will be on the field or court, or in the rehearsal hall or stage, others may have to address their teams virtually until the "all-clear" is received later this year, but these men and women will be vital to the success of high school activity programs this year.

Their tasks almost seem larger than life this year and they deserve our utmost respect and appreciation. In addition to teaching skills and strategy, they will be faced with additional daily tasks related to COVID-19, or keeping their team members connected and motivated in a virtual setting. But these heroes will undoubtedly rise to the occasion and seize the **opportunity**.

In an education-based setting, the focus is on coaching the whole person. Especially given the challenges this year presents, school administration and school boards should continue to fund and empower coaches regardless of whether they are coaching virtually or in-person.

The look of high school sports and performing arts will be different in 2020-21, but there is one constant available to everyone – **opportunity**."

- Compete for a high school varsity team during the respective sport season.

- Display exceptional sportsmanship during the season of nomination.
- Display leadership qualities during the season of nomination.
- Display commendable citizenship and have no NDHSAA Training Rule Violations during academic year.
- Have never been suspended from respective athletic team or the school of representation during academic year.

















# Lifetime Membership

To purchase a Lifetime Membership the prospective coach must have been:

- A North Dakota High School Coaches Association Member for 20 years
- An active high school coach for at least 25 years either in North Dakota or another state

#### **Notes on Lifetime Membership**

- Lifetime Membership may be purchased for a one-time fee of \$300. In order to become a Lifetime Member, one must first be a member; which is \$60. The lifetime Membership fee would be \$360 total.
